About the Civil Rights Data Collection

The Civil Rights Data Collection gathers and publishes key information about student access to educational opportunities and school climate from public schools (pre-K through 12th grade) in all 50 states, D.C., and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico¹. Since the 2009-10 CRDC, the Office for Civil Rights has published the number of students receiving referrals to law enforcement and school-related arrests data from the nation's public schools.

Is an action by which a student is

REFERRAL TO LAW ENFORCEMENT

agency or official, including a school police unit, for an incident that occurs on school grounds, during school-related events, or while taking school transportation, regardless of whether official action is taken. Citations, tickets, court referrals, and school-related arrests are considered referrals to law enforcement.

Is an arrest of a student for any activity

SCHOOL-RELATED ARREST

conducted on school grounds, during off-campus school activities (including while taking school transportation), or due to a referral by any school official. All school-related arrests are considered referrals to law enforcement.






